Richard Lombard— Nesting Report

Richard Lombard submitted an annual summary of the nesting success of *Eastern Bluebirds and Tree Swallows* off Bailey Lane, Georgetown. These eight boxes are within the Parker River wetlands, protected public land that is managed by the Georgetown Water Department.

Richard has shared his extensive data with Cornell Lab of Ornithology <u>NestWatch</u> <u>Program</u> (our next story reviews this excellent Citizen Science program).

"During 2020, bluebirds produced a total of 18 eggs and 9 fledglings.

Swallows produced 37 eggs and 33 fledglings. The 2020 season was very successful for tree swallows. In fact, more swallows fledged from the nest boxes than any previous season.

This nest box season also had the earliest first egg date for bluebirds – April 1st"

Spring Plans for PRCWA

WATER QUALITY, PRCWA, AND COVID19

Plans are forming to re-start our watershed monitoring program in May, 2021. We have two optical dissolved oxygen, conductivity, and temperature handheld probes that reduce the contact with sampling water. PRCWA is also considering purchasing a flow meter to allow more accurate comparisons between river flow and water quality.

A Hidden Jewel


Newburyport's Little River Trail System

PRCWA created the Little River Nature Trail and later the Little River Trail System to help educate visitors to the importance of watersheds, wetlands, and unique habitats such as vernal pools. Five trail heads, consisting of interpretive signage and informative kiosks, teach the public vital knowledge on the ecology of the Upper Little River Watershed.

Two new kiosks were added by PRCWA volunteers. An Eagle Scout project assisted by local Boy Scout Troop 251 made possible an extensive bog bridge that saddles one of the Little River watershed's largest expanse of wetlands. This new stretch allows the visitor to stay dry while getting closer to local wildlife, such as frogs and marsh birds. Since November, many hikers have come to at least one of the five trails just so they can experience this forest wonder.

PRCWA is looking forward to providing even more infrastructure to assist visitors in experiencing an immersive watershed education. DCR has generously given PRCWA an extra year to fulfill the MassTrails \$50,000 grant obligations.
